That's equivalent to around 13,685 city buses full of waste lined up end-to-end from Sydney to Newcastle.


Three quarters of the City of Sydney's residents live in apartment buildings, so how your strata community looks after waste and recycling can make a real difference.

How to set your building up for success

Residents are more likely to recycle in clean, well-organised bin and chute rooms.

This can also reduce cleaning and maintenance costs.

Residents use waste infrastructure better when:

- the space is well-lit, tidy and cleaned frequently to reduce odour and pests.
- bins are in good condition. Order bin repairs through our website: city.sydney/binrepair
- bin lid colours are correct and bins are grouped with others of the same colour.
- red lid bins appear first on entry to bin rooms.

How to set your building up for success

Did you know effective bin signs in apartment buildings can increase recycling by 14% That's truck loads. Keep signs clear and consistent for residents. Only use the most recent City of Sydney signs to ensure the information is correct.

Services you can access

What goes in which bin

Yellow lid bins - Recycling

Recycle plastic bottles and containers, glass and aluminium containers, paper and cardboard in City of Sydney provided recycling bins. Make sure all packaging is empty and dry.

Please avoid plastic bags going into yellow lid bins

They cause major problems and ruin everyone's good work.















Green lid bins – Garden organics

Grass clippings, prunings and leaves will be made into compost and mulch.















What goes in which bin

Maroon lid bins

- Food scraps

Participating apartment buildings can recycle food scraps. Find more information on the next page.





Red lid bins

- Rubbish

These should be used as a last resort for items that cannot be reused, recycled, or composted.





Food scraps recycling

We offer a food scraps recycling service to residential apartment buildings.



Images: Food scraps program participants, Potts Point. Photography by Katherine Griffiths We provide participants with everything they need to recycle food scraps, including food scrap bins, small kitchen caddies, and an initial supply of compostable caddy liner bags.

Food waste typically makes up one third of our residents' red lid rubbish bins.

By collecting and recycling food scraps, we can reduce landfill waste and create beneficial products like fertiliser and compost.

By using our food scraps recycling service, you could potentially reduce the number of red lid bins in your building and save money on your rates.

Bulky goods

We collect old furniture, mattresses, whitegoods, electronics and other big household items.

We'd like your help to manage bookings and inform residents about this free weekly pick-up service.

- One booking for each item group per week is available. If your building has lots of bulky items, book regular collections to ensure each pick-up is under our 4m3 limit.
- Assign a building manager, cleaner or resident representative to make bookings for your building online: city.sydney/bulkygoods
- Ask residents to contact this person when they have unwanted household items for collection.
 You could put up a notice with all the details in the common areas.
- Make sure items are separated into 3 groups:
 1) mattresses, 2) furniture and bulky items,
 3) metals, whitegoods and electronics.
- If space is available, set up a collection point inside the building to store items in between collections.
- Use any other communication channels you have, such as Facebook, email or digital signs, to regularly remind residents about the pick-up service.



Tricky waste collection



Doorstep recycling

A free and easy way for residents to recycle tricky items that don't belong in the bin.

Make it easier for residents to participate by creating a designated drop-off area in your lobby and provide access to the driver to collect the bags.

We collect:

- · clothes in any condition
- · small electronics and batteries
- · light bulbs
- empty vapes
- polystyrene
- x-ray scans
- · aluminium coffee pods
- · printer cartridges
- paint
- tablet blister packs

Recycling stations

Drop off the following items at our stations located in City of Sydney customer service centres, libraries and community and recreation centres:

- · household batteries
- mobile phones
- · small light bulbs
- small electronics (less than 11cm wide)

Textile recycling

In NSW alone about 305,000 tonnes of clothing is discarded every year.

Coffee pods

Coffee pods cannot be recycled in City of Sydney yellow lid bins.

Many apartment buildings have set up their own coffee pod recycling as it doesn't require much space.

Recycling pods can turn coffee grounds into compost, and the aluminium can be infinitely recycled into new products.

Nespresso offers free collections, we also offer a free collection through our doorstep recycling service, or visit TerraCycle for more information on other programs.

Book exchange

If you have space, setting up a book exchange on common property is an easy way to recycle unwanted books and bring residents together with minimal upkeep.

Usable furniture

Remind your residents of local services that re-home furniture and other household items.

Erko Apartments

From garbage holding room to unlimited magical recycling possibilities

Wendy is Erko's waste and recycling champion.

She reimagined and transformed this space in Erskineville into a recycling hub.

How it works

Residents can take what they need and leave what they can in the dedicated re-use room - everything from DVDs and toys to stationery and crockery.

- A new packaging station makes shipping and moving easier with access to boxes and bubble wrap.
- Residents can also recycle tricky items like coffee capsules, light bulbs and textiles.

Community buy-in was key to the room's success. Wendy fostered support by creating:

- bespoke multilingual signage in the waste room, lifts, and foyers
- · regular social events and charity collections
- an active Facebook group to promote social connection.

Residents appreciate the convenience of the recycling facilities - there's no need to conform to set drop-off times or travel to set locations across the city.

Lessons

- Start small and build momentum.
- Get all the help you can: cleaners, building managers, volunteers and subscription services.
- Enjoy the wins and focus on the positives.

Altair:

the apartment building going the extra mile with recycling

A key to Altair's success is their long-standing building manager, Mario. The ardent recycler is held in high regard among the residents of Altair.

In addition to the City of Sydney's recycling services, residents can recycle:

- coffee pods this collection is a hit with residents
- · secure paper shredding
- · needles and syringes
- textiles the building set up a clothing donation bin

How it works

- Mario installed changeable lift notice boards with easy-to-understand information so residents receive regular issue updates and reminders about recycling opportunities.
- Regular owners' newsletters provide background information on significant initiatives that do not require voting.
- Statement of purpose explicitly includes a sustainability benchmark.

Lessons

- Make sustainability a core value and consider it in all aspects of decision-making.
- Waste education takes time and perseverance.
- Communication messages should be simple, signs clear, and recycling receptacles kept in the one area to avoid confusion.

How to encourage your residents

Try these tips to help you educate and empower your residents.



Provide new residents with recycling information in a welcome pack including:

- where to find waste and recycling bins and other onsite or local recycling facilities such as charity clothing bins.
- information about what goes in what bin.
- · how to use the chute system correctly.
- how to book a household bulky pick-up and where to leave these items.
- a link to the City of Sydney waste and recycling webpage cityofsydney.nsw.gov.au/ waste-recycling-services

We also offer recycling guides in Simplified Chinese, Indonesian, Thai and Russian.

Take new residents on a tour of the building's waste and recycling facilities.

- Communicate with your residents about recycling through social media, posters or your building's newsletter. Consider translating your communications into other languages, if needed.
