Background

The City of Sydney is creating a new park and smaller link park in north Rosebery.

These 2 new parks will provide important green space for a growing community to enjoy.

The larger park is at Crewe Place, Confectioners Way and Rosebery Avenue. The smaller park links Rosebery Avenue to Steadman Street and Confectioners Way.

This project is part of our work to build new parks, upgrade existing ones and work with developers to provide more than 21 hectares of 40 parks and playgrounds in the Green Square area.

Naming proposals

Inspired by the historic sweet making enterprise on this site, we propose to name the park Allsorts Park and the smaller link park Honeykiss Park. We invite your feedback on these names.

The new parks are on the site of the former Sweetacres factory of James Stedman Henderson Ltd, which opened in 1918 on Rothschild Avenue, Rosebery.

Engagement summary

From 5 March to 6 April 2021, we asked the community for feedback on concept plans and naming proposals for two new open spaces in North Rosebery.

Consultation on the plan provided an opportunity for stakeholders and the community to review and comment on the design and proposed names.

Consultation activities included online engagement, a pop-up stall in the park, a letter to residents and project signage at the park.

This report outlines the community engagement activities that took place to support the consultation and summarises the key findings from the consultation.

Purpose of the engagement

The purpose of the engagement was to:

- gather feedback from stakeholders and the community about the proposals
 - determine the level of satisfaction with the revised concept design
 - determine the level of satisfaction with the proposed names.

Outcomes from the engagement

Over 500 pieces of feedback were received during the consultation. Below is a break-down of the feedback received:

- 123 people left a total of 194 comments on our interactive Social Pinpoint map
- 12 naming proposal quick surveys were completed
- 5 park design quick surveys were completed
- 5 email submissions were received
- 80 people (approx.) attended a pop-up in the park

Submissions received from organisations

- 1 submission received from Meriton
- submissions received from 2 local childcare centres

Key findings

Dogs

There was strong debate during consultation over whether the park should be an on-leash park or off-leash park. People concerned about the park being off-leash raised safety of children, people not picking up after their dogs, and impacting the ability to enjoy the lawn for other activities (eg. frisbee, kickarounds, picnics, community gatherings etc) as key reasons.

Comments in favour of the park being off-leash included the amount of dogs in the area compared to the provision of off-leash facilities. There were suggestions that the nearby Sweetacres Park could be on-leash and focused on children's play, and this park could be a dedicated dog park.

Other comments suggested looking at fencing, restricting off-leash to certain times of day, and looking more strategically at the off-leash and play provision in the area.

Sporting provision

The provision of sporting areas such as a multi-purpose court, area with skateable elements and table tennis were strongly commented on. There is concern that these facilities will increase noise in the area, especially at night.

There were some comments in support of these areas. Comments in support included the fact that these are areas where older children can play. We received many more comments not in support these areas, citing noise as the key concern.

Playground

Comments on the playground included requests for shade and support for plenty of swings that accommodate a range of ages. There was support for the provision of play opportunities for younger and older age groups. Nature play, imaginative and accessible play were also supported.

Some comments were in favour of a fence around the playground, especially if the rest of the park will be off-leash. Other comments received did not support a fenced playground, but a softer separation between the different areas.

Naming

A total of fourteen submissions were received. "Honeykiss Park" received strong support, feedback on "Allsorts Park" was more mixed, with half of the submissions in support and the other half either not in support or neutral.

People in support cited links to the history of the site and interpretation in the park design as key reasons. People not in support of "Allsorts Park" cited concerns that without reference to "licorice" in the name, the meaning of "allsorts" could be unclear and interpreted in different ways.

Three submissions suggested either dual naming or naming using an Aboriginal word. Suggestions included "Gudji" (honeybee) or "Jumbalung" (bumblebee).

Context

Naming proposals

We're creating a new park and smaller link park in North Rosebery. We invite your feedback on the design and proposed names for these new open spaces.

The larger park is 5,600m² and located at Crewe Place, Confectioners Way and Rosebery Avenue. The smaller park is 4,200m² and links Rosebery Avenue to Steadman Street and Confectioners Way.

The proposed names pay homage to the confectionary industry, once prominent in the local area.

The new park and smaller link park are located on the site of Sweetacres, the large factory of James Stedman-Henderson's Sweets Ltd, which was opened in 1918 on Rothschild Avenue, Rosebery

Allsorts Park: licorice allsorts were a popular Sweetacres product. The park's landscape design is inspired by the layering in a licorice allsort.

Honeykiss Park: honey kisses were a famous sweet made by James Henderson and continued by Stedman-Hendersons.

These two new parks will provide important green space for a growing community to enjoy.

The larger park is at Crewe Place, Confectioners Way and Rosebery Avenue. The smaller park links Rosebery Avenue to Steadman Street and Confectioners Way. A map showing the location of these spaces is on the second page of this letter.

The design for the larger park includes:

- an open lawn
- paved plaza space
- playground with nature play and equipment for younger children
- play opportunities for older groups
- a multipurpose court
- native plants, picnic and BBQ area and amenities.

The smaller link park design includes retaining the fig trees, and feature lighting and better footpaths for people walking and cycling.

Works to install the lighting in the smaller park have already started and will be complete in late February. The smaller park will be delivered in two stages. The second stage will be built on completion of the adjacent development.

This project is part of our work to build new parks, upgrade existing ones and work with developers to provide more than 21 hectares of 40 parks and playgrounds in the Green Square area.

Naming proposal

We propose to name the new park and new link park Allsorts Park and Honeykiss Park respectively, and we invite your feedback on these names.

The new parks are on the site of the former Sweetacres, the factory of James Stedman Henderson Ltd, which opened in 1918 on Rothschild Avenue, Rosebery.

The names originate from:

- **Allsorts Park:** licorice allsorts were a popular Sweetacres product. The park's landscape design is inspired by the layering in a licorice allsort.
- **Honeykiss Park:** honey kisses were a famous sweet made by James Henderson and continued by Stedman-Hendersons.

The nearby Sweetacres Park and two streets – Sweet Street and Confectioners Way – have also taken their names from the historic sweet making enterprise in this area. Allsorts and Honeykiss parks would be the last spaces in the precinct to take their names from the historic sweet making enterprise.


