Clover turning the first sod

CROWN STREET UPGRADE BEGINS!

The first sod has been turned on our multi-million-dollar revamp of Crown Street in Surry Hills. The \$34 million project will beautify Crown Street between Devonshire and Oxford streets and includes wider footpaths, new paving and street furniture including bubblers. bins and bike racks. There will be new garden beds and more street trees, boosting canopy cover by 50%. Additional car parking spaces are also planned. Powerlines will be placed underground and efficient and high-quality lighting will be installed on smart poles. Construction will be carefully staged to limit disruption.



A NEW PLAYGROUND FOR WOOLLOOMOOLOO! **Construction will start early next**

year. The plans are the result of extensive community consultation. The fully-fenced playground will feature a hamster wheel, climbing nets, slides, swing set, see-saw, monkey bars, a rock-climbing structure and new nature play elements. We're also planting new shrubs and trees and increasing seating throughout the park.

AND NEW SPORTS FACILITIES AT PERRY PARK

We're upgrading and building new sports fields across our area to meet the needs of our communities. This includes a new FIFAsized synthetic sports field at Alexandria and a new amenities pavilion. There will be better park lighting and seating with more convenient access. This is in addition to other excellent community facilities nearby including the Perry Park Recreation Centre which features four indoor multipurpose courts, the Getiela sports field in Alexandria, which meets world rugby and FIFA standards, and the Gunyama Park Aquatic and Recreation Centre sports field nearby at Green Square.

ANNUAL SIGNIFICANT **CULTURAL EVENTS**

Each year we host our NAIDOC in the City event in Hyde Park showcasing Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures, drawing thousands of visitors. Last year's New Year's Eve fireworks opened with a smoking ceremony, followed by a spectacular "Calling Country" display curated by Indigenous artists. In July, 5000 people came to Prince Alfred Park for a Yes23 event.

LOCAL ABORIGINAL KNOWLEDGE AND CULTURE CENTRE

This is nearing completion in the former Redfern Post Office building at 119 Redfern Street. The City purchased this landmark building in the heart of Redfern. Located close to inner city Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities and services, it is highly visible and culturally significant.

AND BEYOND EORA...

We use our grants program to support Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander organisations. We use our grants program to support Aboriginal and for os of all Islandor organisations. We have provided \$4.5 million since July 2017 on events like the ANZAC Day Coloured Diggers March and organisations including IndigiSpace, in support of employment and training, economic development, and cultural productions. In 2022, we established the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander collaboration fund valued at \$500,000 a year. In its first year, the fund supported several programs including First Nations Response which provides food to 250 local families, and Wyanga Aboriginal Aged Care Program - an organisation that provides tailored, culturally appropriate care services to Elders in their homes. We strongly advocate for affordable housing for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, most recently as part of the proposed redevelopment of the Waterloo housing estate. We also fund a coordinator for Aborigin who works with local community housing providers, and we recently sold land at a discount to enable the Gibbons Street apartments in Redfern.

In the recent past, the heritage and cultures of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities were not visible nor celebrated, so the City committed to redressing that omission. This recognition work is guided by our Eora Journey program. Eora means "the people" in Aboriginal language of Sydney, so the Eora Journey is "the people's journey".

The Eora Journey has four linked commitments:

We're committed to creating works of national significance by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander artists and designers. Already we have installed four major artworks: "Welcome to Redfern" by Reko Rennie; "Born in darkness before dawn" a projection on the Australian Museum by Nicole Foreshew; "Yininmadyemi", (Thou didst let fall) in Hyde Park by Tony Albert, and "bara" by Judy Watson on the Tarpeian Precinct Lawn. We are also developing "Yananurala" (Go, walking on Country) a harbourside walk which will highlight sites of significance for Aboriginal peoples and histories.



ECONOMIC **DEVELOPMENT PLAN**

Adopted by Council in November 2016. One of the actions was for the City to implement an employment strategy. In 2023, the City launched its inaugural Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Workforce Strategy 2023–2026 which aspires to make the City an employer of choice by creating a culturally competent and skilled workforce.

Filled with comfortable seating and space for working or studying quietly, with access to wifi, computers, printers, photocopiers and scanners. Our newest library, Darling Square, houses a "maker space" with programs offering access to 3D printers, laser cutters, precision drills, power tools and other equipment. Libraries are for everyone. Babies visit for storytime in English, Mandarin or Auslan with their parents, or carers. Retirees visit to stay social and active and learn new tech skills. And of course, our libraries welcome students, readers and people who want internet access. Unstaffed links at Town Hall and Pyrmont are convenient options for members to collect and return loans. The City is responsible for Paddington Town Hall and we partner with Woollahra Council who manage Paddington Library.
